
From the desk of the Chief

closing their doors. The reasons vary, but most often include lack of funding or community support, lack of volunteers, increased regulatory or educational requirements. The Squad has seen and felt the impact of all of those issues in its past 50 years.

Spread the Word, but Skip the Infection

How Long do germs survive? It depends on the type of bacteria or virus and what kind of surface they are on. Most bacteria, viruses and fungi need moisture to survive so moisture in the air and surfaces can also affect how long they live outside the body.

Cold viruses have been shown to survive on indoor surfaces for more than a week. In

general, viruses survive for longer on non-porous (water resistant) surfaces, such as stainless steel and plastics, than porous surfaces, such as fabrics and tissues. Although cold viruses have been shown to survive on surfaces for several days, their ability to cause an infection starts to decrease after 24 hours.

Most cold causing viruses survive on hands for a much shorter time. Some only last for a few minutes but 40% of rhinoviruses,



a common cold-causing virus, are still infectious on hands after one hour.

<u>Flu viruses</u> capable of being transferred to hands and causing an infection can survive on hard surfaces for 24 hours. Infectious flu viruses can survive on tissues for only 15 minutes. Like cold viruses, flu viruses survive for much shorter periods on the hands. After five minutes the amount of flu virus on hands falls to low levels.

Flu viruses can also survive as droplets in the air for several hours and low temperatures increase their survival in the air.

<u>Stomach bugs</u> -There are many germs that can cause a stomach bug. They include bacteria such as E coli, salmonella, Clostridium difficile (C difficile) and viruses such as **norovirus** and rotavirus.

Salmonella survives for short periods of around 1-4 hours on hard surfaces or fabrics. Norovirus and C difficile, however, can survive for much longer. In one study, C difficile was shown to survive for five months. Norovirus can survive for days or weeks on hard surfaces.

When someone with norovirus vomits, the virus is distributed in small droplets in the air. These droplets can settle on surfaces, causing the virus to spread, so it's important to clean surfaces thoroughly if someone in your home has been infected with norovirus.

To help prevent the spread of stomach bugs wash your hands thoroughly and regularly, particularly after going to the toilet, and practice good food hygiene.

<u>MRSA</u> The staphylococcus aureus bacteria that cause MRSA infections can survive for days to weeks on surfaces. MRSA bacteria can live on surfaces for longer than some other bacteria and viruses because they survive better without moisture. Generally, MRSA bacteria survive longer on hard surfaces than on soft surfaces.

<u>Preventing the spread of infection</u> It is not always possible to avoid catching an illness, but there are ways to reduce your risk and to prevent infections spreading to others:

- Wash your hands regularly, particularly after going to the toilet, before handling food and after coughing, sneezing or blowing your nose.
- Keep your home clean and particularly if a member of your family is ill.
- Wash fabrics that may be contaminated with bacteria or viruses at 60°C (140°F) and with a bleach-based laundry product.

Board Report—BY Eileen Peco, Chairman of the Board

The Squad Board thanks all of our dedicated volunteers for stepping up to the call for additional hours to keep our ambulances and vans running 24/7 during these hot summer months. It is the dedication of so many volunteers that keeps the Squad strong and able to serve the community.

The Board also welcomes the new members to the Squad. It's wonderful to see new faces and meet new friends, and we welcome each of you to the Squad "family". The new programs to recruit volunteers have been successful in both educating the community about the Squad and attracting new interested members.

FINANCES: So far this year the budget is being carefully managed. Through May we are overrunning income by 41% thanks in large part to unanticipated donations and bequests, and gains on investments. We are also underrunning budgeted expenses by 14%. The net result is positive net income of \$60,033 through May 31, 2015.

Investments (CDs, etc.) have remained stable over the year. Unfortunately as some CDs mature we are unable to reinvest at the same interest rate as before. The Board continues to evaluate investment options for the Squad's reserve funds. These funds are critical for future replacement of ambulances and building reserves. Therefore the board has diversified funds among several investment options. Unfortunately, interest rates continue to be very low for fixed investments.

While we are financially stable, fundraising is an ongoing process to ensure the health of the Squad in the future. Plans for the annual fund drive have already begun. In addition the Squad is seeking grants and other sources of funding.

UPCOMING PROJECTS: Insurance Renewal: The Squads insurance policy is up for renewal August 1. The Board is working with insurance agent Mack, Mack & Waltz on this renewal.

DISASTER PLANNING The hurricane season is upon us. The Squad participates with the community in disaster preparedness. The Board is working with the Chief and operations staff to review and revise the Squad's Disaster Preparedness Plan to ensure that we will have adequate resources in the event we are hit by severe weather.
