An Advance Directive Is the Most Important Gift to Give to Your Family

If a serious accident or illness should happen to you, what happens next? Is there someone you trust who can make healthcare or end-of-life decisions for you? Unfortunately, a medical crisis can occur at any time and at any age. Completing an advance directive can be a gift to those around you. Family members and friends will not have to guess what you want if you cannot speak for yourself.

When you go to the doctor, you discuss what types of procedures and treatments that you do and do not want. You listen to an explanation, you weigh the pros and cons, and then you decide what you want to do. But what if you couldn't communicate your wishes about your care? Anyone over the age of 18 can complete an advance directive tool such as Five Wishes which is produced by Aging with Dignity (www.agingwithdignity.org) and written with the help of the American Bar Association's Commission on Law and Aging. This tool is easy to use, and gives you the opportunity to express how you wish to be treated if you get seriously ill or were incapacitated in an accident. At Haven Hospice, we encourage members of the community to complete a copy of the Five Wishes and make complimentary copies available throughout the year.

The Five Wishes

- 1. Who will make health care decisions for you when you can't.
- 2. The kind of medical treatment you want or do not want.
- 3. What you want done for your physical comfort.
- 4. What you want done for your emotional and spiritual comfort.
- 5. What you want your loved ones to know.

Writing down your wishes is just the first step in the process. Having that important conversation with family and friends about those wishes can be challenging. When asked, most of us would answer that we would prefer to die in our homes, free of pain and surrounded by family and loved ones. But too often, the discussion about what to do when curative therapies and treatments are no longer feasible is often delayed or avoided.

There are many events and opportunities that may trigger this type of conversation with family and friends. There may be a related topic on television or at the movies. Perhaps a sermon you heard together at church may inspire some conversation or perhaps you are doing some financial planning. Personal experience, art, culture or stories in the news can offer opportunities for starting the conversation and making your wishes known.

Consider completing an advance directive and having that important conversation today with your family and
