They also looked for what happened to the children. Because of the data they knew how many had been treated and where. They put in air pollution levels they had and found a correlation. They had several models of information; I have only mentioned one. Now I look at those reports a little differently.



In the near future, we will be able to utilize a state funded array of reports like the one described above. I will keep you posted as to when this will be available to us.

The months of study, work, tests and stress are finally over-you think. Then slowly reality starts to hit when the Captain tells you that you will be running alone in just a few days. That's just enough time to start the anxiety all over again. You stress over the potential of your first day-you anticipate childbirth, snakebite, cardiac arrest. You question your judgment, knowledge, instinct, preparation-there are still a million unanswered questions.

The time is 10:04 on a Sunday morning-you have been ready since 6:20. Yes, it is your first call and it is an elderly person who has fallen in the church parking lot. The service is over, half the congregation is trying to get out of the lot and the other half is watching you. The half watching seems also to be praying and you are hoping their prayers are also for you. Then an amazing series of events starts to happen – all of the months of training kick in, all of the procedures for a fall and a potentially injured hip are executed perfectly and the crew performs the most flawless and gentle "scoop" imaginable. You feel a sense of pride and accomplishment – also relief – it is as if you have been doing this for years. Maybe all of the prayers are working.

Now you are in the back of the ambulance with the patient, she's frightened, she's in pain, you see fear in her eyes. You hold her hand and brush her cheek and start her talking about her grandkids. Her body relaxes a bit, there is a gentle smile and then a soft spoken "thank you."

I guess that's what this is all about. I could never have imagined a greater reward. My friends say that I have never worked so hard to accomplish something, put in such long hours, for no money and loved it more! Without a doubt, this is one of the best thing I have ever done.
