Safety First, Always Tim Zion, Asst'. Chief, Safety

Getting home after a shift is something we rarely think about and it's probably a rare day when something unusual happens, that reminds us not to take our safety for granted. But we should be safety conscious all the time and here are a few tips to keep in mind.

- 1. Be aware of your surroundings: Remember Scene Safety! Scene overview begins the moment the call comes in. Weather conditions, road conditions, road construction and traffic flows are some of the things to consider when responding to any run. And if you see something, let your crewmates know about it.
- **2. Pay specific attention to the scene:** Whether we are at a residence, facility or accident scene, be aware of everything around you. Watch for things that may pose a risk to you, your crew and your patient. These may include obstacles to getting our gurney in and out safely; slippery surfaces, broken or uneven sidewalks or curbs. At an accident scene, it might include downed power lines and oncoming traffic.
- 3. Wear appropriate safety gear and equipment: Whatever the call is, make sure you always have your gloves on! This is the bare minimum and the standard we use. Make sure you have sturdy shoes - no flip flops, crocs or slip-on shoes.

At accident scenes, wear the safety vests that are in the ambulance and make sure each crew member wears one. Depending on the situation, you may need face

masks or goggles. These are in each ambulance. And remember if the scene involves hazardous materials, we stage until the higher authority clears us to assist or

And any crew member should feel free to remind other crew members to put on their gloves, check the scene and point out hazards or obstacles.

What's New?

The Differences between Advanced Directives and DNRs?

As people age and plan for their retirement, they often have many legal documents to consider. In addition to wills and estates, there are several health-related documents that many include in their legal considerations and these can be confusing.


Often we are asked what a DNR (or DNRO) is and how do people get one? A Do Not Resuscitate Order, known as a DNR or DNRO, is a legal form that specifies that the holder named on the form, does NOT wish to be resuscitated should they be found without a pulse and not breathing. This does NOT mean they do not want medical treatment if they are still alive - with a heartbeat and breathing.

In Florida, the form must be on yellow paper and signed by a Florida licensed doctor to be legally valid. It should also be kept in a place where it can be quickly found or retrieved by healthcare providers and EMS services. You can obtain a DNR(O) form from your doctor, online, and usually from your estate attorney. And it is always wise to discuss this with your doctor and your family, so they understand your wishes.

Advances Directives are also known as Living Wills. Most hospitals will ask older patients or their families if the patient has a Living Will and to provide a copy of it for the hospital. This legal document specifies what medical actions the pa-

tient wants, should he or she no longer be able to speak or make decisions for themselves. As an example, it may include such actions as providing oxygen or fluids or withholding them. This document should be discussed with your doctor, family and legal counsel to carefully lay out any course of medical action that they patient desires, should they become incapacitated.

You should discuss these issues with your family, your doctor and/or attorney in making these decisions
